Schindler's list is based on the novel "Schindler's ark" written in 1982 by Thomas Keneally. Because of the high success of the book, the movie was adapted in 1998. It was directed and produced by Steven Spielberg and written by Steven Zaillian. On account of the great production by the producers and cast, they won many awards, such as: The Academy Award for Best Picture, Academy Award for Best Music, Academy Award for Best Direction, BAFTA award for Best Film, Golden Globe Award for Best Motion Picture and Academy Award for Best Writing. The film takes place during the old Nazi Poland, where the Jews were exterminated by the German regime.
